Tian Chua is a Malaysian labour organiser.

On 10th April 2001 Tian Chua was arrested. He has not been charged. On 24th April 2001 he was officially detained under Malaysia's infamous Internal Security Act (ISA).

The ISA allows for detention for two years. The Minister for Home Affairs can extend the detention for a further two years at the stroke of a pen. Tian Chua is coming to end of his first two years detention. Hundreds of Malaysians have been detained under the ISA just because they dared to organise and speak up independent of the repressive Mahathir government. As a labour organiser Tian assisted workers across all races in Malaysia.

Malaysia's ISA was enacted in 1960. It extended the former colonial legislation giving the Malaysian government "sweeping powers including the ability to deprive a person of his or her liberty indefinitely without trial for preventative reasons and to prohibit meetings, ban publications and exclude books and periodicals."

Organisations and individuals in Malaysia have bravely resisted the repression brought about by the ISA. In November 2002 a High Court ruling ordered the release of a detainee saying police had failed to provide any evidence for the arrest. In response Malaysia's Prime Minister Mahathir Mohammed, said the ISA would be strengthened so that it could not be questioned in court. Workers, students and political activists have borne the brunt of this disregard for human rights.
